



INTRODUCTION

The city of Hernando is in northwest Mississippi and is the county seat of DeSoto County. Hernando's estimated population is 16,811 (2019) and is part of the Memphis, TN, metropolitan area with an estimated population of 1.3M (2013) that includes other parts of Mississippi, Tennessee and Arkansas. Hernando is located at the intersection of Interstates 55 (north/south) and 69 (east/west) and is in close proximity to the region's other transportation options of air, rail and river based in Memphis. Hernando provides a high quality of life with a vibrant downtown square, A-ranked school district, big box and boutique retail, appreciating housing market, and a portfolio of parks and other public spaces.

Recreation facilities and programming are important investments for all municipalities. Recreation facilities provide important environmental, aesthetic, and recreational benefits. They are also a source of positive economic benefits. They enhance property values, increase municipal revenues, bring in homebuyers and workers, and attract retirees. This Feasibility Study & Business Plan for Recreation Facilities and Sports Tournaments for the City of Hernando serves as a document intended to strengthen both Hernando's quality of life and local economy.

Attractive and popular recreation facilities have a major local economic impact through spending and job creation. Sports and recreation tourism (travel that involves either observing or participating in a sporting event or recreation activity) is a fast-growing sector of the global travel industry and equates to \$7.68 billion annually. Hernando is part of the Memphis Metropolitan Area which has a population of more than 1.3 million. The Feasibility Study & Business Plan for Recreation Facilities and Sports Tournaments for the City of Hernando provides recommendations and supporting data for the City to invest in feasible and profitable ways to improve its recreation offerings to capture sports and recreation tourism spending within the Memphis Metro Area and surrounding sports tourism footprint.

SUMMARY

The purpose of the Feasibility Study & Business Plan for Recreation Facilities and Sports Tournaments for the City of Hernando is to provide the City's elected officials, staff and recreation stakeholders the information needed to make strategic investments in recreation facilities and programming. This study is a multi-year, multi-phased plan for improvements to existing parks and recreation facilities and new facilities intended to improve quality of life and create sales tax revenue increases, new jobs, and place a stronger stake in the region's sports tourism economy.

The planning process for the Feasibility Study & Business Plan for Recreation Facilities and Sports Tournaments for the City of Hernando began with an evaluation and documentation of existing park and recreation facilities and operations. After the planning team understood existing conditions and operation, Stakeholder input was gathered through a public kick-off meeting with open dialogue and input forms. An online survey was also posted. Through these avenues the planning team gathered stakeholder input related to existing facilities, new facilities and recreation related travel. Next, the planning team gathered data on the region's recreation economy by researching local demographics, Hernando's location and accessibility, lodging and accommodations, corporate and



university presence, local attractions, climate, and local market issues. Based on these criteria, the planning team found strong local demographics with issues such as limited hotel stock, corporate/university presence, and competition for tournament play due to facilities and Hernando's lack of an image as a sports tournament destination.

The following section represents a condensed description of the recommendations outlined in the Feasibility Study & Business Plan for Recreation Facilities and Sports Tournaments for the City of Hernando. All recommendations are described in more detail in Section 4.

The following primary proposed improvements are those that offer user experiences that are emerging or unique in the regional market or offer partnering opportunities with existing tournaments or events within the region. These improvements will foster mostly single day trips but make use of Hernando's limited hotel capacity while building demand for expanded hotel and restaurant capacity.

- 1. Tennis Complex The plan calls for an 8-court tennis complex addition to Milton Kuykendall Park to allow Hernando to compete or partner with other complexes in the region (Southaven, Oxford, Senatobia, etc.). Milton Kuykendall Park is within close proximity to the W Commerce Street commercial corridor and the downtown square. It also offers existing support infrastructure such as parking, utilities and track/exercise equipment. The recently resurfaced courts at Conger Park or existing courts at Church Park would serve as overflow for tournaments that require a 10-court or 12-court complex. The proposed courts would be located on DeSoto County School District property. A joint agreement between the City of Hernando and DeSoto County School District would be required.
- 2. Indoor Multi-Use Recreation Facility The plan calls for a 30,000 square feet multi-use facility at Renasant Park. This facility includes two (2) full-size basketball courts with pickle ball striping, concessions, restrooms, offices, meeting space and storage. It would accommodate indoor court activities that are currently hosted by Desoto County School District facilities. More importantly, the large multi-use court space could host events such as eSport, archery, and cheer/dance tournaments, training, galas, receptions, or other private events attracting guests and participants from across the region. Participants would be directed from I-55 to Commerce Street and south on Highway 51, getting a glimpse of the Commerce Street corridor and downtown square. The City should monitor the development of private indoor recreation facilities and their uses to avoid any duplication or competition for events and activities.
- 3. Trails & Greenways The plan includes site plans showing improvements to each of Hernando's 11 public recreation parks and facilities. Most of these parks are connected by shared use pathways and greenways identified in the City's Bicycle & Pedestrian Master Plan adopted in June 2019. The plan calls for a high priority to be placed on the establishment of trails, particularly those that connect parks and greenways that provide unique user experiences. Trail walking, jogging and cycling are very popular outdoor recreation activities in the Memphis area as witnessed on any of the region's many trails such as the Greenline, which has an estimated annual economic impact of \$2.9M.
- **4. Equestrian Arena at Civic Center** The plan calls for more support for Equestrian events at the Civic Center. First, the Civic Center property lease needs to be solidified with a long-term lease



or purchase agreement. Proposed improvements include a new loop road with trailer and RV parking as well as a new restroom/concession building, horse barn with 20 stalls, main arena lighting upgrades, bleachers, and other support amenities. Equestrian event participants are a well-traveled group and often purchase fuel, food and supplies in and around event locations. Most equestrian participants travel with lodging, but still need accommodations such as water and power for their trailers and RV's. The City should be aware of a potential new agricenter on Star Landing Road that can accommodate many of the same equestrian events/activities and other large events.

5. Skate / Bike Park Expansion – The plan includes several areas for expansion adjacent to the existing skate park at Renasant Park. These new skate and bike areas would accommodate skate and street bike features for all ages. The current skate park is very popular and is often overcrowded and cannot accommodate large numbers of skate and bikers. Expanded offerings will bring more attention to the park in the form of casual use and programmed events.

The following secondary proposed improvements are those that depend on higher sales tax revenues, job creation, and increased recreation budgets due to prior investments in recreation facilities, programming, and staffing.

- 1. Baseball / Softball at Civic Center The plan calls for basic improvements to the baseball/softball fields at the Civic Center. These improvements are based on the need for improved accessibility and user experience and include paved, accessible surfaces to connect parking areas to each field, concession, restroom and pavilion amenity. In some cases, these paved access routes will improve maintenance access to fields and other programmed spaces in the park. The plan also calls for new shade pavilions in use areas that are currently lacking and safety netting to better protect the existing playground area. Improvements to the fields are also needed in the form of better drainage, improved lighting, and increased maintenance of infield and natural turf areas.
- 2. Soccer Complex The plan calls for improved accessibility, both vehicular and pedestrian with the addition of paved parking, vehicular turnarounds, and sidewalk connections to each field and use areas. The plan also calls for better space delineation with the addition of bollards and curb and gutter to limit vehicular access to field and pedestrian areas, striped crosswalks at pedestrian / vehicle conflict points, and lighting throughout the parking areas to increase pedestrian visibility. The plan calls for the remaining fields to have scoreboards and to be lighted to maximize usage. Shade pavilions, tree planting and improved signage is also identified in the plan to increase user experience.
- 3. Stage & Bandshell The plan calls for a stage and bandshell with terraced seating in Conger Park. There is an existing wood stage at Conger Park that is currently being used for various events. The addition of a permanent concrete stage and bandshell with rigging, power and ADA accessibility would increase user experience for existing events and add demand for new outdoor events potentially drawing people from throughout the region to attend unique events supported by the newly developed space.
- **4. Trails & Greenways** The plan includes site plans showing improvements to each of Hernando's 11 public recreation parks and facilities. Most of these parks are connected by shared use pathways



and greenways identified in the City's Bicycle & Pedestrian Master Plan adopted in June 2019. The plan calls for a high priority to be placed on the establishment of trails, particularly those that connect parks and greenways that provide unique user experiences. These projects should remain a priority through the life of the implementation phase of this plan.

5. Other Improvements to Existing Parks – The plan includes improvements to all parks as described in Section 4 and illustrated in the included site plans and opinions of probable cost. Each park is slated for improvements to existing features, expanded uses of existing features, or new features and amenities such as new play equipment and features at E Parkway Park and the Gale Center, early learning and adaptive play equipment additions at Church Park, bike trails and basketball courts at Lee's Summit Park, restroom at Addie Baldwin Park and improved walking/jogging trails at Conger Park. These improvements will add quality of life and be the result of the positive economic impact of the primary proposed improvements.

Economic Impact of Proposed Improvements – The planning team member Trent Lott Center for Economic Development at the University of Southern Mississippi determined the economic impact range of the proposed improvements to be \$1.6 million (low), \$5.6 million (medium), or \$36.1 million (high) in revenue and will support 67 (low), 288 (medium), or 656 (high) direct jobs, with value-added \$3 million (low), \$7.4 million (medium), or \$16.8 million (high), respectively. More specifically, depending on low, medium, or high demand, it is expected that an additional 7, 20, or 45 indirect jobs and 5, 21, or 47 induced jobs will be created with the impact of \$429K, \$1.4 million, or \$5.9 million, respectively. In total, the updated sports/recreation facilities can support substantial employment (80, 329, or 748 jobs) and economic impacts of \$2.0 million, \$7.0 million, or \$16.0 million annually for the region. Lastly, the updated sports/recreation facilities can generate \$49K, \$157K, or \$357K in fiscal impact or tax revenue for the city. A breakdown of the total tax revenue resulting from the updated facilities (low, medium, and high demand) is in Section 5 Table 5-2.

Implementation – The purpose of the Feasibility Study & Business Plan for Recreation Facilities and Sports Tournaments for the City of Hernando is to provide the City's elected officials, staff and recreation stakeholders the information needed to make strategic investments in recreation facilities and programming and reap the economic rewards to either pay down balances accrued or reinvest into new recreation investments.

- 1. It must be a priority Implementing the plan takes dedication and commitment. These improvements must be a priority with all local officials.
- 2. It takes a leader/champion A champion should be identified that can connect the improvements to members of the community, connecting individual user groups that typically operate in silos and breading confidence in the proposed improvements and economic data presented in this study. This does not have to an elected official, but does need to be someone who is recreation minded and not solely focused on one aspect of recreation (i.e. baseball, soccer, etc.).
- **3.** Revisit a local sales tax referendum for parks, recreation and tourism A local sales tax referendum on food/beverage and lodging for Hernando parks, recreation and tourism should be



revisited. A previous effort failed to gain support, but that effort lacked leadership, organization and supporting data. This study provides the supporting data that can be formatted into various graphics or other media to inform members of the community to run a true campaign that presents facts that can connect to each individual community member. Connect with those who previously opposed the referendum and address their concerns through education or economic opportunities offered by investments in parks, recreation and tourism. Learn from other municipalities that have moved through a similar process. Numerous communities have passed local sales tax referendums that are producing revenue streams that can only be used to improve their community's parks, recreation and tourism efforts. Southaven, Saltillo, Columbus, Charleston, Lexington, Baldwyn, Carrollton, North Carrollton, Flowood, Starkville and Amory have passed or are in the process of establishing referendums.





2.1 EXISTING FACILITY INVENTORY

Hernando has (10) park areas comprising approximately 119 acres. A field survey of the City's existing parks and recreation facilities was conducted and individual park inventory sheets were created (attachment 1).

During inventory, parks were evaluated on a 4-tier scale

- 1 Poor (facility has issues which need to be addressed) (ie. Maintenance, safety, or update)
- 2 Fair (facility needs some attention)
- 3 Good ((facility is functioning and serviceable; minor issues)
- 4 Excellent (facility recently renovated and needs no major improvements)

The scale looks at various aspects of the park including ADA compliance, quality of equipment, attractiveness, amenities, safety, condition, the number of fields/courts, adequate signage, and generate a score 1 -4. The score in each area is added creating a composite score, which provides an understanding of the condition of the park.

SERVICE AREA ANALYSIS

The city of Hernando has ~119 acres of developed park land. Based on the National Recreation and Parks Association (NPRA) 2019 Agency Performance Review Benchmarks found 10.1 acres per every 1,000 population. Per United States Census Bureau current population is 16,811 with a service area within 10 minutes of 27,152. Based on 10.1 acres per 1,000, Hernando needs between ~169.68 to ~273 acres of park lands depending on the population that Hernando is trying to serve.

The current system provides about 70% of the recommended acreage for the 2020 population. At a minimum, an additional 50 acres should be considered to meet the metric benchmark. The metric report also indicated there is generally one park per 2,181 residents. With 10 parks in Hernando, based on 16,811 residents, there ratio in Hernando is in range with 1,681 residents per park.

NRPA has developed a facility demand analysis, which in turn creates a needs analysis based on population and usage areas. Since Hernando has a larger service area vs its population number, the needs analysis will provide a range for these areas, based on a low to high versus current available.

DEMAND PROJECTIONS

By applying current populations to the facility development standards established for Hernando, current and projected demand for facilities can be established. Example of calculation:

Activity: Tennis/unit: Court/standard: 1 court per every 2,500

Projected population Hernando 16,811

Facility demand = 16,811 x (1 court per every 2,500 people) = 6.72 Courts (rounded up to 7)

NEEDS PROJECTIONS

By utilizing the amount of demand calculated for each type of facility, the actual need can now be determined. The table above shows present number of facilities related to demand, resulting in either a negative number of facilities (indicating need) or a positive number (indicating over-availability).



2.2 PROGRAMMING & EVENTS

The Hernando Parks and Recreation Department has programming that is run by the Parks and Recreation Department as well as the Community Development Department. Both departments bring something to the table and both can be impactful for the sports/event tourism possibilities.

This section will briefly look at existing programs so the administration can evaluate the current impact and see the potential for is already in place. The first section of events are the activities provided in conjunction with Community Development Department.

The following programs provide opportunities for Hernando to provide Sports/Event Tourism as well as meeting the basic quality of life needs of the residents of Hernando. These opportunities should be explored in conjunction with expanding tournament opportunities in various sports. The City has some private/public relations with the Chamber of Commerce, the high schools, and other vendors. There appears to be a good number of volunteers and community support groups that assist with programming. Overall, there appears to be city buy-in on the events offered but based on surveys, citizens are always looking for expansion of existing opportunities as well as exploring new opportunities for programming and athletics.

HERNANDO WATER TOWER 10K

This event had almost 500 participants in 2019 and was up 38% in participation from 2018. As an annual event, this allows participants to put this event on their calendar and plan for it. With participants from 10 states and 50 cities, this is the type of event that brings money and recognition to Hernando. By tying this event into the Front Porch Jubilee (Blues event), a synergy is created. This also provides another reason for participants to stay after the completion of the event. By creating a public/private partnership with Excel by 5 (EB5) and providing downtown business incentives for downtown merchants, this event is a great example of working several aspects of sports/event tourism together for the benefit of the entire community and the participants. This event also brought in 40 volunteers and coordinated social media efforts which brings attention to Hernando.

HERNANDO FARMERS MARKET

Hernando boasts the largest open-air market in the state and opens in conjunction with the DeSoto County Earth Day Celebration (end of April) and is open Saturdays through the end of October. The coordination of opening on Earth Day brings a few thousand visitors to downtown Hernando. This market has ~65 vendors and attracts ~100,000 visitors. This market works with eight other markets in the United States, with the University of Wisconsin, and the Farmers Market Coalition. This study has occurred over a 3-year period monitoring shopper trends, visitor counts, SNAP usage, distance traveled to market and variety of food are some of the data points captured. The market will continue data collection in 2020.

In a cross promotion opportunity, free fitness/yoga classes are provided on most Saturdays, free paint potter or art painting classes, food demonstrations, children's day with free activities, senior day, music and other activities are also offered. The POP (power of produce) allows children an opportunity to purchase their favorite fruit or veggie. This facility uses the SNAP and allows for EBT usage, with double transactions through a grant to improve health and food equity in the community. The market also accepts WIC and senior vouchers.



DICKENS OF A CHRISTMAS – (HERNANDO IS A DESTINATION)

This event was a new event to help bring Christmas spirit to Hernando and increase sales in the downtown during the Chamber of Commerce Christmas Open House. This open house is from 10AM – 5PM. The Dickens event was from 1PM – 5PM, with anticipated expansion this year.

There were thirteen community partners, including the farmers market, DeSoto County Museum and Arts Council and many local non-profits. Retail establishments had the highest number of sales.

HISTORIC TOURS

This is an opportunity that is being explored and with potential partner the Desoto County Museum. Through the USDA Farmers Market Promotion Program grant, there are some opportunities for marketing this event. This would be an event coordinated with Mayor's Youth Council using GIS locators to map historic and Blues markers to create a map.

BICYCLING PROGRAMS

Hernando has an adult bicycling grant. Currently the city has twelve (12) bicycles, helmets, locks and chains that are housed at the back of the Gale Community Center. These are available for check out to the public. At this time, this program is underused but could be tied into a city-wide bicycling/trails plan for the city.

The Parks and Recreation Department facilitates a total of twenty-three (23) programs for the citizens of Hernando, with ~5,469 participants. The programs are outlined as follows:



2.3 MANAGEMENT & BUDGET

The current Parks and Recreation organization chart is outlined below:

As outlined in the table and as it currently stands the Hernando Parks and Recreation Department is slightly under-staffed. The recommended organization and management structure would place the director, assistant director, which would be a new position and the receptionist management level positions. The director's position would be responsible for big picture and long/short term vision, personnel development, finding grant and funding opportunities and developing capital improvement projects. The director's role should be to assist all department personnel in facilitating their work activities and should be available should anyone need assistance to complete tasks due to personnel, lack of equipment or funding issues. In addition, this role is the direct liaison with the city administration to convey issues and work toward achieving city and department goals.

The created position for assistant director would be responsible for day to day operations and personnel issues. That is not to say, this position is desk confined. The assistant director should be working with the division supervisors to make sure programs and activities are being executed on a timely basis in addition to working with them directly on policy/procedure and overall program/activity management.

The receptionist should be able to fill the role of payroll and department procurement for purchase orders and expenditures and provide direct support to all department personnel as it relates to these areas. The receptionist is not only the front line of customer service for the citizens and participants but should also assist department personnel behind the scenes when possible.

The program director, both sports directors and maintenance supervisor should report directly to the assistant director. This should give the assistant director the personnel resources to divert personnel as needed for large special or athletic events. The maintenance supervisor and maintenance



workers need to understand during hiring that there are times of the year when maintenance work will be slow or will not be a full-time opportunity. It is during these times personnel will need to be made available to other divisions within the department to assist as necessary. Although the recommendation is for twelve full-time employees to operate the Department, based on the size of service area, Hernando Parks and Recreation personnel have outlined the need for one additional position of Sports Coordinator as the secondary priority for additional personnel.

In conjunction with the staffing section, recommended organizational chart for Hernando Parks and Recreation Department would be as follows:

WHEN AND HOW TO ADD NEEDED STAFF

(Priority #2)

Increasing staff would require a discussion that would include the Parks and Recreation Director and the Administration. The position(s) would be contingent on acquiring the funding shortfall outlined in the budget section of this report. The Director would outline the job descriptions, responsibilities, and explain the need for the requested personnel. This would also show the gap in the level of work that is expected by the Department and the public while providing documentation showing the number of hours (manpower and equipment) necessary to complete the tasks. By graphically demonstrating the delta between what is currently being done compared to what needs to be done, all parties gain a better understanding and need for the positions.

There are two ways to look at bringing staff on board. The most obvious is during the budget cycle. This would bring staff on board in October at the beginning of the fiscal year. The other alternative is to look at the position of assistant director as a fiscal year hire and look to incorporate the sports coordinator as a seasonal full time during peak sports seasons, or bring in full time later in a budget year, so the full salary would not be paid in year one, but would be full time beginning in fiscal year two. This would stretch these expenditures over two budget cycles.

In discussions with the Park Director, there is a city benefit to creating and maintaining institutional knowledge. In order to accomplish that, the administration and board need to have an understanding of what employee job responsibilities are and the gap that is created in training and bringing in new employees. Maintaining quality staff allows maintenance to improve and get better over time, programs to grow, and more recreational opportunities to be created as employees are not spending time training or reviewing work by replaced employees.

To provide quality venues and environments for sport/event tourism, an effective team with the ability to make decisions and work with limited supervision is necessary. There are several moving parts during an event, and a team of workers, self-motivated with a thorough understanding of their job responsibilities and what it takes to accomplish tasks is not only important, but imperative.

BUDGET

The 2019 NRPA metric has agencies with populations of less than 20,000 budgets ranging from 511K to 1.9K. With the Hernando service area, the expectation would be for Hernando's budget to scale toward the higher end of this range.

The 2019 Hernando Parks and Recreation budget was as follows:

The other NRPA metric is and expenditure of \$78.69 on a per capita basis. Based on the Hernando population of 16,811 and a service area of 22,655, this would equate to a low end budget of \$1,322,857 and the upper end budget of \$1,782,721. At this time, Hernando spends \$60.90 per person. Additional funding to meet the per capita basis would also meet the management issues brought up in the staffing and management section.

The budget revenues are showing a transfer from the general fund in the amount of \$216,445. It is not uncommon for municipalities to transfer more funding as the millage requirement by law is not sufficient to fund a department in the state of Mississippi to meet all of the quality of life goals set forth by the city.

Although Parks and Recreation falls behind public safety (police/fire) and public works in the funding process, the return of expenditure on qualified personnel that can assist in generating additional revenue for the city in sports/event tourism should not be overlooked.

A steady programming/activity based on special/athletic events that bring people to town to stay in hotels and eat in local restaurants should not be undervalued. There are numerous benefits:



LONG TERM IMPACTS OF SPORTS TOURISM

Sports/event tourism involves traveling to a different city to participate or watch a sporting event. Examples include a marathon, tennis tournament, or the regional farmer's market. These activities can have a huge effect on the community. Although, maybe not immediate and obvious, these effects are long lasting.

STIMULATES THE LOCAL ECONOMY

When traveling, visitors are likely to spend money. This includes lodging and food as well as entry fees and concession revenue. There may be memorabilia purchases as well. All of these have economic impact on the community hosting the event.


SPORTS/EVENT TOURISM LEADS TO OTHER TOURISM

Although visitors come to your community for the event, they may also visit retail and other attractions. After the event, word of mouth or social media about your community may bring in other visitors. Participants in the event can often re-visit an area to complete their visit. Visit retail or restaurants they saw but were not afforded an opportunity to visit due to time or event schedule. The goal should not only be to bring in visitors for your event, but to create an atmosphere for the participant/family to visit your community after the event or when they are taking vacation/holiday travel.

ENHANCE THE AREA'S IMAGE

Sports/event tourism can also function as a public relations tool for your community. If participants enjoyed their stay, they will relay the visit to family and friends. This will help boost your community reputation in the public eye. This in turn may bring in businesses or cause people to move into your city.

There are management companies that can assist with event development as well as national associations and organizations that bring event promoters together to find locations to host their events. By funding efforts for sports/event tourism, the city should look at these budget numbers as an investment, not an expenditure of funds.





3.1 SUMMARY

The city of Hernando is located on the northwest border of Mississippi and is part of DeSoto County, including the cities of Horn Lake, Olive Branch, and Southaven. Hernando is easily accessible for visitors via air and road, making it capable of drawing visitors from a vast region.

Based on local market analysis, several key strengths and challenges are identified. The strengths of the local Hernando market include:

- Hernando's population projects to increase by 4.7% by the year 2029.
- The real median household income for Hernando (\$69,179) is significantly higher than DeSoto County (\$62,595), the state (\$42,009), and the national income (\$57,652).
- The employment of Hernando is expected to increase by 12%, which is relatively higher than the state (4%) and nation (8%) by the year of 2029.
- The presence of schools and technical colleges may provide demand necessary to support tournaments or sports events concerning the updated sports/recreation facilities.
- Conveniently located in the northwest part of Mississippi, connecting the region to most major cities, including Memphis, Oxford, Southaven, Jonesboro, Jackson, and Tupelo.
- Hernando is easily accessible for visitors via rail and road, making it capable of drawing visitors from a vast region.
- Hernando has a mild climate throughout the year.
- Affordability of destination.

On the other hand, some of the challenges as they relate to supporting sports/recreation facilities in the city of Hernando include:

- Lack of large (or significant) corporate presence in Hernando.
- Distance from major cities in the state of Mississippi and other adjacent states, where each city offers its own sports/recreation activities for local demand).
- Lack of significant-quality hotel properties; the largest hotel property (i.e., upper-middle scale) is only 82 rooms, while two other economy hotels may not accommodate larger groups in a single hotel property.
- Limitations in local traditional visitor amenities (e.g., nightlife, entertainment, downtown, etc.).
- Lack of Hernando's image as a sports event destination to sports planners.

Based on the analysis of existing sports/recreation facilities, researchers identified several vital strengths and disadvantages. The strengths (i.e., pros) of the existing sports/recreation facilities are:

- Baseball/softball/soccer fields are adequate to meet the needs of the local community.
- Playground equipment at Conger Park is new and modern.
- Soccer complex has a new building that offers modern concessions and air-conditioned restroom facilities.
- Renasant Skate Park is a unique facility with the potential to add an expansion.



- Resurfaced track at Milton Kuykendall Park.
- Opportunity to expand and add more sporting activities at Milton Kuykendall Park. For example, field can be used for multiple community events such as adult/child flag football, adult ultimate Frisbee, corn hole tournament, city festival, and charity walk/run relays or converted to a tennis complex.
- Opportunity to build on the existing equestrian facility.
- Potential for flag football leagues, ultimate Frisbee leagues, Lacrosse, field hockey and outdoor archery events at the Hernando Soccer Complex.
- Tennis courts in great shape and potential to add pickle ball stripes and larger event space with permanent stage, bandshell and terraced seating to Conger Park.
- Potential to add a splash pad to one or more parks.

On the contrary, some of the disadvantages (i.e., cons) as the city of Hernando must improve in order to increase residents' quality of life, as well as attract out-of-town visitors include:

- Major improvements needed at Civic Park in terms of ground work, building/fence repair, updated concession, restrooms, improved parking.
- Add lighting to soccer fields that do not have lighting.
- Security lighting needed at many parks.
- Safety issues with hockey arena not belonging to the city.
- ADA issues at most facilities.
- Drainage issues at all facilities are a concern.

3.2 INTRODUCTION & PURPOSE

INTRODUCTION:

The city of Hernando is located on the northwest border of the Mississippi and is part of DeSoto County, including the cities of Horn Lake, Olive Branch, and Southaven. Hernando is easily accessible for visitors via air and road, making it capable of drawing visitors from a vast region. For example, Interstate 55 runs through the heart of the city, effortlessly connecting the area to most major cities, including Memphis, TN (30-mile radius), Jonesboro, AR, Jackson, TN, and Tupelo, MS (90-mile radius). Memphis International Airport is within an 18-mile radius of the city, offering an average of 80 commercial flights per day to Los Angeles, Las Vegas, Denver, Dallas, Orlando, Miami, Atlanta, Charlotte, Minneapolis, Chicago, Detroit, Pittsburgh, Washington D.C., Baltimore, Philadelphia, Newark, and New York.

According to the United States Census Bureau (USCB) (2020), the city's median household income was \$69,179, the median housing value was \$81,100, and the number of total housing units was 5,500. Its retail trade area population reached 27,998 in 2019 (EMSI, 2020). The city of Hernando has a fairly small corporate presence with only two companies in the region employing more than 300 people, Wal-Mart Distribution (502 employees) and Wal-Mart (300 employees).



Specifically, for Hernando, the majority of the businesses are very small, with 1 to 4 employees, while over 60 percent of the city's businesses employ fewer than 10 people. More importantly, Hernando's local attractions range with a variety of options, such as Cedar Hill Farm, DeSoto County Museum, the Lewis Ranch, Hernando Golf & Racquet Club, Conger Park, Church Park, Renasant Park, Ark Trail, and Lee's Summit Park.

In considering the feasibility of an outdoor recreation sports activity, Hernando has a mild climate with increased rainfall in late winter and early spring.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this study is to evaluate the current sports/recreation facilities in Hernando, MS, and to propose improvements to the facilities, including tournaments or sports events. In this regard, this study aims to help decision-makers in Hernando understand the pros and cons of current facilities for the existing sports/recreation facilities or if there is a need to build a new facility in the city. In order to complete this study, researchers performed the following tasks:

- Analyzed economic and demographic characteristics and trends of the area, such as population, employment, and corporate presence, including the lodging industry
- Evaluated the pros and cons of existing sports/recreation facilities, including current usages (e.g., sports tournaments)
- Identified comparable (or competitive) facilities to existing facilities in Hernando
- Proposed recommendations to improve existing sports/recreation facilities

The specific deliverables of this study include:

- 1. General Market Overview presents the overview of the area's population growth trends, industrial diversification and growth trends, economic trends, attractions, and other unique factors.
- 2. Analysis of Existing Facilities analyzed the pros and cons of existing facilities in the city of Hernando.
- 3. Competitive and Comparable Facilities offers comparisons of various characteristics and resources of competitive and comparable facilities and their regions relative to existing facilities in the city of Hernando.
- 4. Conclusions include recommendations to the city of Hernando.

3.3 LOCAL MARKET ANALYSIS

In order to fairly evaluate the existing sports/recreation facilities and identify market demand utilizing the sports/recreation facilities in Hernando, researchers conducted a comprehensive review of the local market analysis relative to the national and/or state averages. The main objective of this analysis is to 1) examine the level of support that exists for the existing sports/recreation facilities and to 2) identify the opportunities and challenges that may affect the ongoing competitiveness of the facilities within the area and beyond.

In general, critical indicators of a region's ability to provide ongoing competitiveness and support for the existing sports/recreation facilities are demographic information, such as population, education attainment, employment/unemployment, and household income.



In this regard, an analysis was conducted on these attributes as they relate to the existing sports/recreation facilities in Hernando. In particular, the study of local market conditions addresses the following areas:

- 1. Demographics
- 2. Location and Accessibility
- 3. Lodging and Accommodations
- 4. Corporate and University Presence
- 5. Local Attractions
- 6. Climate
- 7. Local Market Issues and Conclusions

1 - DEMOGRAPHICS

1.1 CURRENT POPULATION

Economic Modeling Specialists International (EMSI, 2020) indicates that Hernando had an estimated Retail Trade Area Population of 27,998 in 2019, while Desoto County had an estimated population of 187,732. As shown in Table 3-1, the state of Mississippi in 2019 had a population of 2,988,590 and the United States had a population of 329,399,330.

Over the next ten years, the Retail Trade Area Population in Hernando is projected to increase by about 4.7% (totaling 29,319). By the year 2029, Hernando is anticipated to gain an additional 1,321 residents, while Desoto County is projected to increase by about 8.6%, for a total of 200,708 residents. In comparison, Mississippi is projected to increase by 0.2% (5,856), and the United States is projected to increase by 4% (11.684,758) by 2029.

1.2 PROJECTED POPULATION




Figure 3-1 2019-2029 Hernando Projected Population by Age Cohort

Figure 3-1 illustrates the forecasted population in terms of age cohort from 2019 to 2029. Population segments in Hernando are all expected to increase, except the age cohorts '10-24', and '45-54.' Among these, the largest population decline will be seen in those aged 10-24 (487 people), followed by 45-54 (298). Interestingly, the projected population between '80-84' will significantly increase over the same time period by 45% (224 people).

As per the forecasted population by race/ethnicity (see Table 3-3), the highest percentage increase group is 'Asian, Non-Hispanic' (29%), followed by 'Black, Non-Hispanic' (28%), and 'White, Hispanic' (14%). The largest number change by group is 'Black, Non-Hispanic', which is projected to increase by 998 people, followed by 'White, Non-Hispanic', which is projected to increase by 152 people.

As per the projected population by gender, Table 3-4 shows that the greatest change by number is in females with a projected increase of 747. The number of males is also projected to increase by 574 people, which represents a 5% change in females and 4% in male groups.

1.3 EDUCATION LEVEL

The majority of the educational attainment groups are similar to the national percentages. The largest difference is with the 'less than 9th grade' and 'Bachelor's degree' with a 3% and 4% deficit respectively. EMSI projects the DeSoto County's population to grow to 135,015 by 2029. With this projection, EMSI (2020) estimates that 31% of the population will have their high school diploma for their minimal educational attainment.

1.4 INDUSTRY EARNINGS

The industries with the highest average earning in Hernando was Finance and Insurance (\$71,866), followed by Management of Companies and Enterprises (\$68,553), and Wholesale Trade (\$66,636). As shown in Table 3-6, the lowest paying industry in Hernando is Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation with average earnings of \$16,469, followed by Education Service (\$17,186) and Accommodation and Food Services (\$17,543).

1.5 HOUSEHOLD INCOME

According to the Data USA (2020), the median household income in Hernando was \$69,179, which is higher than the national average (\$61,937), the county (\$62,595) and state (\$42,009) averages. Also, its median housing value was \$181,100, and the number of total housing units was around 5,500.

2.0 LOCATION AND ACCESSIBILITY




Figure 3-2 Map of the City of Hernando with Radius

Hernando, located in the northwest corner of Mississippi, is 26 miles south of Memphis. Interstate 55 runs right through Hernando on the way to Memphis. Highway 304 and MS 713 runs through Hernando as well. The largest city close to Hernando is Memphis, TN, which is within 30 miles. Within 60 miles, Oxford and Southaven are located in proximity, while Jonesboro, AR; Jackson, TN; and Tupelo, MS within 90 miles of Hernando. Figure 3-2 shows the location of Hernando within the state of Mississippi and its proximity to major U.S. cities.




Figure 3-3 Hernando Hotels Map



4.0 CORPORATE AND UNIVERSITY PRESENCE

The largest employers in DeSoto County range from 500 estimated employees to 54 estimated employees. The largest employers in DeSoto County are Wal-Mart Distribution, Wal-Mart Shopping Center, and the DeSoto Memorial Hospital (see Table 3-10). These large businesses may provide a local market for updated sports/recreation facilities because the workers may have families that can utilize the facilities.

As shown in Table 3-11, specifically, for Hernando, the majority of the businesses are very small, with 1-4 employees. These businesses make up 33 percent of Hernando's total business environment. Over 60 percent of Hernando's businesses employ fewer than 10 people. Only 1.3 percent of Hernando's businesses employ over 100 people. This indicates that Hernando does not have a large corporation or manufacturing presence outside of the Wal-Mart and its distribution center.

4.2 REGIONAL COMPARISON




Figure 3-4 Hernando Employment Compared to Mississippi and National Progress

The number of jobs, as shown in Figure 3-4, in the city of Hernando is expected to increase between 2019 and 2029 by 12%, creating an additional 1,130 jobs in the city, while DeSoto County is expected to increase by 17% creating 12,351 new jobs. The state of Mississippi is expected to increase by 4% creating 54,556 new jobs, and the nation is expected to increase by 8%, creating 13,969,813 jobs, respectively.

4.3 UNEMPLOYMENT

The city of Hernando has an unemployment rate of 4.3%, which is a lower rate than the county and state average. Mississippi's average unemployment rate is 5.2%, which is above the national average. According to FRED (Federal Reserve Economic Data, 2020), Mississippi's unemployment rate has decreased over the last five years and it is projected to stay down due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

In most industries, Hernando is projected to grow over the next five years (2024). However, several industries are expected to lose jobs moving into 2024. 


Figure 3-5 Attractions and Park Map for Hernando, MS




Figure 3-6 Average Temperature in Hernando by Month




Figure 3-7 Average Rainfall in Hernando by Month

7.0 LOCAL MARKET ISSUES AND CONCLUSIONS

Based on local market analysis, researchers identified several key strengths and challenges. The strengths of the local Hernando market include:

- Hernando's population projects to increase by 4.7% by the year of 2029.
- The real median household income for Hernando (\$69,179) is significantly higher than DeSoto County (\$62,595), the state (\$42,009), and the national income (\$57,652).
- The employment of Hernando is expected to increase by 12%, which is relatively higher than the state (4%) and nation (8%) by the year of 2029.
- The presence of schools and technical colleges may provide demand necessary to support tournaments or sports events concerning the updated sports/recreation facilities.
- Conveniently located in the northwest part of the state of Mississippi, connecting the region to most major cities, including Memphis, Oxford, Southaven, Jonesboro, Jackson, and Tupelo.
- Hernando is easily accessible for visitors via rail and road, making it capable of drawing visitors from a vast region.
- Hernando has a mild climate throughout the year.
- Affordability of destination.

On the other hand, some of the challenges as they relate to supporting sports/recreation facilities in the city of Hernando include:

- Lack of large (or significant) corporate presence in Hernando.
- Distance from major cities in the state of Mississippi and other adjacent states, where each city offers its own sports/recreation activities for local demand.
- Lack of significant-quality hotel properties; the largest hotel property (i.e., upper-middle scale) is only 82 rooms, while two other economy hotels may not accommodate larger groups in a single hotel property.
- Limitations in local traditional visitor amenities (e.g., nightlife, entertainment, downtown, etc.).
- Lack of Hernando's image as a sports event destination to sports planners.



3.4 ANALYSIS OF COMPARABLE FACILITIES WITHIN THE SERVICE AREA

This section provides a summary and analysis of comparable sports/recreation facilities. The summary and analysis will be beneficial to understanding how similar markets are performing within current industry conditions and sports/recreation facilities, including indoor and outdoor sports activities offered by competitors, and other characteristics that affect the potential demand for the sports/recreation facilities in Hernando. The data gathered from this analysis will also help determine the ability of Hernando to attract potential visitors if the proposed improvements are successfully executed.




Figure 3-8 Map of Comparable Facilities

Therefore, within this section, comparable analysis is conducted as it evaluates the pros and cons of the existing sports/recreation facilities in Hernando. Figure 3-8 shows the location of the comparable sports/recreation facilities.

1.0 COMPARABLE FACILITIES

1.1 GREENBROOK SOFTBALL COMPLEX





Location: 800 Stowewood, Southaven, MS 38671

The softball complex includes 8 professionally manicured softball specific fields. Specific dimensions include 5 fields @ 225', 1 field @ 275' (portable fencing used when needed), and 2 fields @ 300' (portable fencing used when needed). Additional complex amenities include Southern Athletic TurfTM infield mix / conditioner on all infields, Tifton 419TM Bermuda on all outfields, MuscoTM lighting on all fields substantially exceeding minimum youth field requirements, computerized irrigation system on all fields, Thor Guard Lightning Detector system throughout the complex, subsurface drainage on all fields, electronic scoreboards with clocks and operators on all fields, covered and enclosed dugouts, covered area for all fans on each field, main control/scoring tower overlooking 4 out of 8 fields, scoring tables at remaining 4 fields, 6 phone jacks for news and press personnel in the main control tower, full service concessions in the main control tower with additional concession kiosks throughout the park, entire complex side walked and surfaced with professional landscaping, and ample paved parking. The softball park utilizes park sponsors.





The newest addition includes the Greenbrook Indoor Softball Training Facility, completed in 2019. It was included in the City's Parks Enhancement and Expansion Plan and designed by UrbanARCH Associates. The 7,800 square feet addition houses 4 tunnels for hitting and pitching training with removable nets to transform into a large, multi-purpose training area. Additionally the facility includes a general space for team or parent gatherings as well as a concession area, bathrooms, office for tournament directors, and locker room space for umpires.

The softball complex has been awarded numerous World and National Events, including the 2001 10U USSSA Fastpitch National Championship, and the 2002 thru 2025 Dizzy Dean Girls Fastpitch World Series in the 6U thru 18U divisions. The Tennessee High School Association (TSSAA) has recognized in the past the exceptional features of the complex. The facility has also played host to the Gulf South Conference (NCAA Division II) Women's Softball Championship Tournament. Additionally the facility received the tremendous honor by hosting the 2003-2005 Tennessee High School Fastpitch State Championships (TSSAA Spring Fling). The 2020 tournaments include Bring The Heat (3/21), Spring Fling (4/18), Memorial Day Expo (5/22-24), Spring Into Summer (5/30), and Summer Heat (6/19-20).

The facility was completed in 2000. Greenbrook Park Fastpitch Tournaments and the city of Southaven Parks and Recreation set up tournaments.

Cons:

- 1 The overall facility while functional is currently a 20-year-old facility.
- 2 The facility does not include any baseball or soccer fields at this location.

- 1 The facility features a functional softball 8 field layout, including a center area with 4 encompassing fields. The additional fields flank both sides of the center area with 2 fields, each including an abundance of parking areas.
- 2 The facility includes a computerized irrigation system on all 8 fields which greatly assists in both appearance and accessibility with the location's heat and humidity.
- 3 The facility utilizes park sponsors as a way to increase fiscal revenues and also promote area businesses.



1.2 CHERRY VALLEY PARK



Location: 7505 Cherry Valley Boulevard, Southaven, MS 38671

The facility includes 20 total acres and 3 football fields. The park complex consists of former baseball fields that have been converted to multi-use fields for football. The football fields are used for football, youth football, and flag football. Age groups for football include the following:

- 5-6 year-old: Flag Football
- 7-8 year-old: Pee-Wee Tackle Football
- 9-10 year-old: Little League Tackle Football
- 11-12 year-old: Junior League Football

The facility is operated by the city of Southaven Parks and Recreation department.

Cons:

- 1. The facility is older and was not built for specific sports in mind and hosting spectators.
- 2. The facility does not include baseball, softball, or soccer fields for organized playing opportunities for youth.

- 1. The facility provides multi-purpose fields for football or other potential sports like lacrosse and rugby.
- 2. The facility has potential for additional recreational sports like kickball and Frisbee.



1.3 SNOWDEN GROVE BASEBALL COMPLEX

Location: 3376 Nail Road., Southaven, MS 38672

The state-of-the-art facility constructed in 1999 encompasses 153 total acres, including 17 baseball fields. All fields include grass infields, sub surface drainage on all infields, Southern Athletic TurfTM infield mix/conditioner on all infields, Tifton 419 Bermuda on all infields and outfields, computerized irrigation system on all fields, Musco lighting on all fields substantially exceeding minimum youth field requirements, electronic scoreboards on all fields, and covered and enclosed dugouts.



Additional amenities include the main concession area with two 50 x 100 pavilions with picnic tables, additional main concessions in Complexes A, B, C, and D, numerous portable concession kiosks throughout the park, VIP area on the second level of main concession, on-site gift shop, entire complex side walked, surfaced with professional landscaping, and ample paved parking. Some of the baseball fields include chair back seating.

The Field of Dreams, completed in 2019, is a mini complex for handicapped and developmentally challenged adults and children. The Field of Dreams Playground costs \$448,400 and is adjacent to the Field of Dreams baseball field near the south entrance of Snowden Grove Park.

There is currently a building project underway at the location to add 7 new soccer fields. There are additional features to be able to add on later for additional fields as needed.

The facility has served as the home to the NABF World Series, 10-year-old USSSA World Series, Dizzy Dean World Series, numerous competitive baseball tournaments, and recreational baseball as well. The facility has local sponsors from the facility including Bank Plus, Athletic House, and city of Southaven.

The 2020 tournaments include Early Bird Classic (3/20-22), Southaven Shootout, (3/27-29), Best of the South (4/3-5), Charlie Respess Memorial (4/17-19), Snowden Slam (5/1-3), MidSouth Select30 USSSA Super NIT (6/19-21), USSSA "AA" Open (5/15-17), Memorial Day (5/22-24), Schools Out Celebration (5/29-31), June Jam (6/5-7), Snowden Grove Classic (6/12-14), Midsouth Select30 USSSA Super NIT (6/19-21), NABF World Series (6/25-28), Dizzy Dean World Series Sessions (Canceled), September Showcase (TBA), USSSA Fall/Winter Nationals (TBA).

The city of Southaven Parks and Recreation Department operates the facility.

Cons:

- 1 The facility while functional is currently a 21-year-old facility but soccer improvements are in process.
- 2 All fields include natural grass requiring regular maintenance.

- 1 The facility has an extremely functional baseball field layout with 4 total 4-plexes for participant use and provides an optimal setup for tournaments.
- 2 The facility uses local sponsors for additional financial revenues while promoting their businesses with signage.
- 3 The Field of Dreams provides access for disabled and developmentally challenged adults and children.
- 4 The facility includes the main concession area plus three additional concession stands and portable concession kiosks throughout the facility.



1.4 SOUTHAVEN SOCCER COMPLEX





Location: 4700 Stateline Road, Southaven, MS 38671

The complex includes 8 total soccer fields, bleachers, and a concession stand. The facility is used for area league play. The DeSoto County Soccer Association (DCSA) utilizes the facility for both recreational and competitive play for both boys and girls from age 4 to adult. The DCSA offers two seasons of play, fall and spring. The playing age begins at 4-years old and goes to 15-years old. Recreational soccer league play includes Under 6, Under 8, Under 10, Under 12, and Under 14 age groups. Games are subject to being held on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays. Additionally, DCSA offers some development academy matches (1-2 per day) for U9-U12 squads, or single state league matches for U13-U18 squads. Competitive soccer includes teams DC Galaxy and Southaven Predators.

Southaven Parks and Recreation Department manages the facility.

Cons:

- 1 The facility does not include any baseball or softball fields for organized play at this location.
- 2 The facility is currently not utilized for tournament play to increase the economic impact to the city and area.

- 1 The complex includes lighted access on all 8 soccer fields to allow both day and night play.
- 2 The facility offers a wide range of ages for recreational play.



1.5 SOUTHAVEN TENNIS COMPLEX





Location: 3750 Freeman Lane, Southaven, MS 38672

The complex includes 8 lighted tennis courts with complex amenities, including a Tennis Pros, Junior Development Program, Director of Tennis, and Associate Tennis Professional.

The Junior Development Program (JD) is designed to help develop players from beginners to tournament players. The program accommodates players from ages 6 – 18. The complex hosts approximately 6 tournaments annually with 5 tournaments sponsored by the Mississippi Tennis Association and 1 UTSA tournament.

Southaven Parks and Recreation Department manages the facility.

Cons:

- 1 The facility provides tennis only access with no team sports facilities at this location.
- 2 With its current setup, the facility could host more tournaments and increase visitors to area.
- 3 The facility could also be utilized for pickle ball play and tournament.

- 1 The complex includes 8 total tennis courts, 4 lighted tennis courts on each side with the middle area for fans.
- 2 The facility includes four full-time staff members.
- 3 The facility's Junior Development Program provides early playing opportunities as young as 6-years old.



1.6 GEORGE M. HARRISON MUNICIPAL SOCCER COMPLEX

Location: 8700 Church Road, Oliver Branch, MS 38680

The facility includes 80 total acres, including five lighted international-size soccer fields, an automated lighting control system, automated irrigation, a small pavilion, and a lake. Additionally, the complex also features a 2/3 of a mile walking trail around the fields.

The soccer complex hosts 1 soccer tournament annually, 3v3 Tournament that is is sponsored by Soccer Allay. The facility hosts both a fall recreational league, with approximately 1,100 participants, and spring recreational league, with approximately 650 participants. The facility is available for public rental.

The complex is operated by Olive Branch Parks and Recreation.

Cons:

- 1) There is no baseball or softball playing fields.
- 2) The facility is not utilized adequately for tournament play and influencing the local economy.

- 1) The facility has 5 lighted international-size soccer fields to provide various ages of play and night-time play.
- 2) The complex includes a 2/3 of mile walking trail encompassing the facility to benefit visitors.





1.7 J.P. HUDSON MEMORIAL PARK

Location: 851 Boothe Street, Batesville, MS 38606

The park includes 3 softball fields, 4 baseball fields, 4 batting cages, 2 pavilions, and a concession stand.

The facility's primary focus is for area recreational play. The park is sanctioned through Dizzy Dean Baseball Inc. There is one annual tournament conducted at the location, Batesville Bash. Normally league play includes a 16 game schedule. Various leagues compose 5 age divisions, including 5-year-old: T-ball, 6-year-old: Coach Pitch, 7/8-year-old: Coach Pitch, 9/10-year-old: Minor League, 11/12-year-old: Freshman League.

Additionally, the park offers play for girls ages 5-16 for fast pitch Dizzy Dean Softball. League formats begins with 6U and 8U coach pitch divisions. Older leagues start fast pitch with 10U division players and continue to 12U, 14U, and 16U. The facility normally hosts softball league play games on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays from April to June. The facility was scheduled to host Dizzy Dean North State Baseball & Fastpitch Softball tournaments during the summer of 2020.

The facility includes an eight-member Board that includes a President, Vice President, Secretary, Park Director, and 4 other board members.

Cons:

- 1 The facility does not provide any soccer fields.
- 2 The facility, with its relatively small number of baseball and softball fields, is not ideal in hosting tournaments.

- 1 The facility includes 4 batting cages which benefits teams and participants for both practice and pre-game warmup activities.
- 2 The facility offers playing opportunities from 5 years old through youth, making it ideal for families with multiple children to participate in baseball and softball at one location.



1.8 MIKE ROSE SOCCER COMPLEX

Location: 9000 East Shelby Drive, Memphis, TN 38125

The soccer complex encompasses 136.17 total acres located near West Service Road and North Airport Road. The complex includes 16 FIFA lighted soccer playing fields, 2,500 plus seat stadium, hybrid Sports Bermuda grass, and lighted playing fields. The fields have a drainage system to assure quick dissipation of water during rainy periods and a state of the art irrigation system is provided to guarantee a healthy stand of grass. Other amenities include fully paved walkways, paved parking spots, permanent restrooms, shaded pavilions, a maintenance building with top of the line John Deere equipment, picnic and recreation area, and a 3-acre lake. The playing surface is state of the art with an underground drainage and sprinkler system. This hybrid Bermuda field is completely flat and measures 116 yards by 72-76 yards. The stadium lighting is at 75 candle light. Participant facilities within the stadium structure include showers and locker rooms, a food court, corporate skybox, full media services, administrative offices, and a conference room.





The facility accommodates exhibition games, tournaments, league games, special events, as well as academies, camps, clinics, and coaches' symposiums. The 2020 events include 2020 SE College Soccer Showcase Boys (1/31-2/2), 2020 SE College Soccer Girls (2/7-2/9), 2020 ODP Inter-Regional Soccer Showcase (2/15-17), Adidas Blues City Blowout (3/6-8), John Talley Showcase/Shootout (3/20-22), the 901 Cup (4/3-5), Adidas Soccer Elite Spring Championship (2/17-19), Adidas Premier Invitational (3/1-3), the Rose Cup (9/25-27).

A Shelby County Government facility privately managed and operated by OS Memphis. Mayor Jim Rout, the corporate community, John Talley of OS Memphis and the local soccer community, engineered the private/public partnership.

Cons:

- 1 The facility, while functional, is currently a 19-year-old facility.
- 2 The facility includes natural grass fields, which require regular maintenance.



- 1 The facility includes 16 lighted soccer fields, and a 2,500 seat stadium, making it an ideal location for hosting tournaments.
- 2 The facility includes a detailed, and coordinated layout with soccer playing fields and ideal parking for participants and spectators.
- 3 The facility is privately managed by OS Memphis.





1.9 TILDEN RODGER SPORTS COMPLEX

Location: West Memphis, AR 72301





The 40-acre facility offers proximity to Interstate 40. The complex includes 12 lighted tennis courts, 5 multi-use ball fields (3 lighted fields), 4 lighted softball and baseball fields, 2 horseshoe pits, and an 8-acre fishing lake with pier. Additional facility amenities include a 1-mile walking track, maintenance facility, picnic shelters with tables and grill, play area, volleyball net, and pavilion rentals. The facility participates in the Family and Community Fishing Program, and the fishing lake receives regular stocking by the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission.

Additionally, the lighted tennis courts are hard surface and located outside. The public has access to the courts and there are no court or member fees.

The facility hosts approximately 12 baseball and softball tournaments annually. Additionally, the facility hosts the Freedom Fest, the annual Fourth of July celebration, on the last weekend of each June.

In December of 2019, West Memphis' voters approved a referendum for a \$12 million renovation project for the city's parks. The funds for the project will come from tax revenue generated by Southland Casino Racing, at no cost to taxpayers. The biggest part of the new project will transform Tilden Rogers Park, and the expanded complex will include 12 new baseball/softball fields with artificial turf and dugouts, 6 sand volleyball courts, 4 soccer fields, new concession facilities and restrooms, additional parking and spaces for buses, connector and walk bridge for fishing and paddle boats, 2 miles of exercise trails, and a dog park. The expansion project aims to assist the complex in becoming the premier youth sports complex in the Mid-South able to attract more tournaments and out-of-town visitors to West Memphis to boost the local economy.

The city of West Memphis owns the facility, and West Memphis Parks and Recreation operates the facility. Staff include a Director, 8 additional full-time employees, 9 part-time concessionaires, 4 part-time employees, full-time mechanic, and head concessionaire.



Cons:

- 1 The facility does not include any soccer fields at this location.
- 2 The facility currently only has four baseball and softball fields each, so not ideal for hosting tournaments. However, there is a planned and approved renovation project underway.

- 1 The facility has an ideal location with proximity to Interstate 40 to attract out-of-town visitors for facility tournaments and boosting the local economy.
- 2 The facility offers 12 lighted tennis courts for public use. These courts could also be used for pickle ball.
- 3 The facility offers unique recreational opportunities in fishing with their area program.



1.10 W.C. JOHNSON PARK BASEBALL-SOFTBALL COMPLEX

Location: 470 W C. Johnson Park Drive, Collierville, TN 38017





The facility encompasses 271.19 acres including natural areas, wetlands, 3 lakes, elevated boardwalk (.70 miles), and an outdoor classroom. The park has a 9-field baseball/softball complex, 2 synthetic turf multipurpose fields, restroom, concessions and press box facilities, a gazebo, Ryan's Place Playground, a water spray park, and 3.15 miles of trails connecting with the Collierville Greenbelt System. The water spray park has 12 stations in a total area slightly larger than the size of a basketball court. Two "touchstone" poles activate the spray stations, which resemble elephants, rainbows, and other items. Spray park passes are required but free for area Collierville residents and \$10 per day for non-residents. The water sprays for a set amount of time until the poles are touched again. An overall park timing system shuts the water off at night. The play areas are designed for children 12 years of age and under to enjoy an aquatic environment without danger of deeper water. Parental supervision is required; no lifeguard is needed at the water park since there is no water depth. A central drain moves the water off the area. The surfaces are lined with a soft, rubbercoated material to make it safe for children. Water Spray Park reservation are accepted for a fee.

The Ryan's Place Playground was built in honor of Ryan Derenburger and dedicated to children with exceptional physical and mental challenges living in Collierville and the surrounding area. The playground design meets the needs of children with disabilities and make integrated play permissible. Ryan's Place Playground is fully accessible and sensory-rich, delighting children of all abilities while providing an integrated place where compassion and acceptance can flourish. The playground aims to sever the needs of the approximately the 1,000 children in the Collierville area and was the third Ryan's Place Playground constructed in the state of Tennessee.



The facility's main focus is on recreational play. There are approximately two tournaments total annually in baseball and softball. Additionally, there are approximately five annual community events at the facility, including Fourth of July Celebration, Christmas Tree Lighting, and Christmas Parade.

The Town of Collierville and Collierville Parks Department manages the facility.

Cons:

- 1 The facility does not include any soccer playing fields at this location.
- 2 The facility is currently not utilized for hosting tournaments to attract out-of-town visitors and boosting the economic impact.

- 1 The facility provides 9 baseball and softball fields for play. These are ideal for hosting tournaments.
- 2 The facility includes a Ryan's Place Playground, providing access for disabled and developmentally challenged children.
- 3 The facility includes a water spray park with 12 spraying stations and is an ideal attraction for children in the location's heat and humidity.





1.11 PERFORMANCE SPORTS INSTITUTE

Location: 237 Woodland Lake Drive, Cordova, TN 38018



The facility includes over 55,000 "turfed" square feet PSI, and is the largest indoor training facility in the southeast. Performance Sports Institute (PSI) caters to baseball, soccer, lacrosse and speed training, and is the state of the art training facility for athletes from age five to the professional ranks. PSI has 2 fields available – the large turf field is just shy of a full sized football field used for baseball, soccer and lacrosse training. The turfed baseball room carries 6 batting cages and 2 pitching stations with turfed mounds.

The facility, founded in November of 2016, specializes in athlete training in multiple sports at all levels. PSI is the home training ground for the Dulins Dodgers Organization, Dulins Baseball (professional instruction), LOBOS soccer, and NO EXCUSE Lacrosse. PSI serves as the training headquarters for numerous professional athletes during the offseason.

PSI is privately owned and managed.

Cons:

- 1 The facility is designed for personal development training instead of organized team play opportunities.
- 2 There are no outside sports facilities available for organized team play opportunities.

Learning Points:

1 The facility provides indoor workout training for baseball, softball, and lacrosse, and is geared to player development rather than organized team play.



1.12 GAMEDAY BASEBALL

Location: 7800 Fischer Steel Road, Cordova, TN 38018



The baseball complex includes 10 baseball fields. USSSA Baseball believes the overall development of all players can be enhanced by the experience and fun of national tournament play. The complex has practice fields available for rental and hosts approximately 15 baseball tournaments annually.

GameDay Baseball is connected to USSSA Baseball with a focus on the development of programs that allow teams of all skill levels to compete against one another. GameDay Baseball 2020 tournaments and events include Memorial Day BASH Rings (5/22), Summer Kickoff Global WS Qlf (5/29), Summer Sizzler RINGS (6/5), Redbirds Classic Global WS QLF (6/22), Midsouth Select30 USSSA Super NIT (6/19), Mid-Summer Classic (6/26), Firecracker Frenzy (7/3), Conway Services Classic Global WS QLF (7/10), Heart of a Champion (7/17), West TN USSSA State Championship (7/24), Rumble on the River (7/31), One Day Shootout (8/8), Battle on the Bluff (8/14), Back to School (8/21), and Fall Bash (8/28).

GameDay Baseball includes five full-time staff including Director of Sales and Marketing/ Administration, Director of Operations, Concessions Manager, Director of Grounds/Facilities, and Tournament Director.

Cons:

1 The facility lacks any soccer and softball fields.

- 1 The facility is well-designed with a 10 baseball fields layout that provides an ideal location for hosting baseball tournaments.
- 2 GameDay Baseball operates the facility and includes five full-time staff.
- 3 The facility hosts approximately 15 baseball tournaments annually.



1.13 BOB HAILEY ATHLETIC COMPLEX

Location: 8750 Farmington Boulevard, Germantown, TN 38139



The complex includes a 44-acre complex on Farmington Boulevard just east of Cameron Brown Park. The facility includes 4 lighted grass infield baseball fields, 3 lighted football fields, a batting cage, electronic scoreboards, concession buildings, walking trails including 600 feet of boardwalk, drinking fountains, parking, 7 acres of wetlands, picnic areas, and 2 restrooms.

The facility is used for recreational youth baseball league. The football fields are utilized for youth football and occasionally recreational kickball. Tournaments have not recently been held at the venue. A Home Run Derby was recently incorporated by Germantown Parks and Recreation to provide a fun-filled event for the community.

Germantown Parks and Recreation operates the complex.

Cons:

- 1 The facility lacks any softball or soccer fields at this location.
- 2 The facility with only four baseball fields, not ideal for hosting tournaments.

- 1 The facility includes 4 lighted grass infield baseball fields.
- 2 The facility includes 3 lighted football fields allowing for youth and flag football opportunities. Lacrosse, rugby, kickball, or Frisbee could be played on these fields.



1.14 GERMANTOWN SOCCERPLEX

Location: 7930 CD Smith Road, Germantown, TN 38138



The soccerplex, located on C.D. Smith Road and adjacent to Germantown Middle School, and includes 20 total acres. The facility includes 4 regulation-size lighted soccer fields, a concession stand, restrooms, bleacher seating, electronic scoreboards, parking, and a walking trail.

The soccerplex is utilized mostly for local recreational play. There are approximately 3 fundraiser tournaments annually conducted by local organizations. Each of the recent tournaments has been 1 day only events.

The soccerplex is operated by Germantown Parks and Recreation Department.

Cons:

- 1 There are no baseball or softball fields.
- 2 The facility includes only four soccer fields, thus not ideal for hosting tournaments.

- 1 The soccerplex includes 4 lighted soccer fields in a participant and spectator-friendly environment that is ideal for local recreational play.
- 2 The field space could be used for flag football, lacrosse, rugby, and Frisbee.
- 3 The facility includes a walking trail.



1.15 HOUSTON LEVEE SKATE PARK

Location: 9777 Wolf River Boulevard, Germantown, TN 38139



The unique facility totals 0.5 acres. The facility can accommodate skaters at all levels, from the beginner to the extreme.

Germantown Parks and Recreation Department operates the facility.

Cons:

- 1 The facility is skating-only and lacks any team sports' facilities.
- 2 The facility services only individual sporting play and will not attract a large number of participants.

- 1 The facility provides an unique individual sporting opportunity with skating for both children and adults.
- 2 Skating parks in general are rare in availability and access.





1.16 ARLINGTON SPORTS COMPLEX

Location: 11307 Memphis Arlington Road, Arlington, TN 38002



The facility includes 10 total acres and 4 baseball fields, 2 soccer fields, tennis, and disc golf.

The newest addition is the tennis facility consisting of 6 tennis courts with an open lawn and other amenities. The \$1.8 million Arlington Tennis Center adjoins the town's existing sports complex at the southeast corner of Memphis-Arlington and Milton Wilson roads. Phase 1 of a larger plan, the work also includes an open lawn, picnic pavilion, restrooms, walkways and parking lot, and town planner. The Arlington school system's high school and middle school tennis teams, which do not have tennis courts of their own, also use the tennis facilities. Arlington Tennis Center is a state-of-the-art lighted outdoor facility with 6 public hard courts, shaded pavilion, bathroom facilities, water filling station, and park area. The same company installed lights that services the U.S. Open pro tournament, can be activated as needed by the public between dusk till close using the automated system on the entrance gates to each set of courts. Lighting remains on for one-hour increments and flashes a 5-minute warning before shutting off. The Tennis Center is under video surveillance to prevent vandalism.

The facility has a permanent 18 hole disc golf course with 4,620' length. The course includes Prodigy Disc T1 target type, concrete tee type, flat elevation, mixed tree and open foliage, and some cart friendly access. Course hole length includes 12 holes under 300 feet, 5 holes between 300 feet and 400 feet, and 1 hole over 400 feet.



There are only a few baseball tournaments annually that are operated by Arlington Parks and Recreation. The facility hours of operation are between sunup to 10:00 P.M. daily

The facility annually hosts the Star-Spangled Spectacular, an annual Fourth of July celebration for the community on the last Saturday of June.

Arlington Parks and Recreation operates the facility and is part of the Arlington Sports Complex.

Cons:

- 1 The facility provides limited baseball and soccer fields and is not an ideal tournament host location.
- 2 The facility does not include any softball fields.

- 1 The tennis facility, with 6 courts, has an automated lighting system on the entrance gates to each set of courts. Lighting remains on for one-hour increments and flashes a 5-minute warning before shutting off.
- 2 The tennis courts could also be used for pickleball.
- 3 The facility includes a unique sporting opportunity in an 18 hole disc golf.





1.17 USA STADIUM COMPLEX





Location: 4351 Babe Howard Boulevard, Millington, TN 38053

The USA Stadium Complex is an outdoor sports complex and entertainment venue totaling 72 acres. The complex offers championship-caliber facilities for amateur baseball, rodeo, rugby, and tractor/truck pulling. The venue is also ideal for fairs, festivals, concerts, and various private and corporate gatherings. USA Stadium is home to Southwest Tennessee Community College baseball and the Memphis Rugby Foundation.

The facility includes 2 baseball fields, concession stand, electricity, and restrooms. USA Baseball Stadium offers a sporting venue for both baseball and rodeo. This stadium seats up to 5,000 for baseball and 2,000 for the rodeo. The venue has 700 parking spaces. Additionally, the facility includes a restaurant and bus/motorcoach parking. The facility hosts approximately 10 tournaments annually and is available for rent.

The city of Millington operates the complex. It is closed in 2020 due to renovations with anticipated reopening in 2021. Discussions are under consideration to sell the facility to a private entity.

Cons:

- 1 The facility only has 2 baseball fields so not ideal for hosting tournaments.
- 2 The facility does not have any soccer or softball fields at this designated location.

Learning Points:

- 1 The facility offers an outstanding setup for spectators with its 2 baseball fields.
- 2 The facility offers a large seating area for multiple events, including 5,000 fans for baseball, and 2,000 fans for a rodeo.
- 3 The large seating area is ideal for annual community events.

4.1 SUMMARY - IMPROVEMENTS TO EXISTING FACILITIES

The planning team conducted onsite evaluations and research of the current Hernando sports/ recreation facilities and have made suggestions for improvements. Currently, there are five existing facilities located in five separate locations. The lack of a central location is inconvenient and not ideal for Hernando residents or out of town visitors. In addition, facilities need both aesthetic and functional improvements in order to better serve residents and visitors and to accommodate potential tournaments which ultimately have a positive economic impact.

The summary of the important recommendation for each facility are:

1. CIVIC CENTER

- Implement ADA compliance in playground and parking areas
- Improve drainage and water runoff in certain fields
- Improve safety/security/trespassing in hockey pavilion
- Add additional parking, including parking for horse trailers/RV for horse facility
- Relocate bleachers closer to fields
- Add protection nets for fans and around the playground area
- Improve maintenance and upkeep of fields
- Increase play areas for a more diverse age group of children
- Continue to improve fencing and backstops (new backstop on Field 8 recently installed)
- Designate softball fields and baseball fields
- Update scoreboard (new scoreboard to be installed Winter 2021)
- Upgrade field and spectator/safety lighting
- Continue to improve concessions area
- Continue to improve restrooms
- Renovate road access to the horse arena.
- Update signage and pavilions
- Repair bleachers
- Add additional shade areas
- Repair and complete barrier wire on the road entry into the ball field

2. CONGER PARK

- Renovate asphalt track which is a safety hazard
- Improve maintenance
- Upgrade restroom facilities including sink areas
- Add safety enclosure to the toddler area
- Update walking trails

3. HERNANDO SOCCER COMPLEX

- Add security lighting
- Add additional shade for participants
- Add lighting to all 9 fields



- Create parking lot barriers (bollards or fencing)
- Renovate unsecured and unmarked crossing areas which require passing through parking lots from fields
- Upgrade parking area including surface and signage
- Implement ADA accessibility
- Add bike parking
- Improve capacity to host tournaments
- Improve maintenance
- Correct drainage areas to eliminate standing water
- Improve seating areas
- Add additional scoreboards
- Improve signage

4. MILTON KUYKENDALL PARK

- Implement ADA compliance for access from the parking lot to open green space
- Correct drainage areas and improve landscaping
- Renovate restrooms and benches
- Update lighting system

5. RENASANT DOG/SKATE PARK

- Implement ADA compliance in parking (reserved concrete spaces but only gravel access to the area)
- Add security lighting
- Add additional seating
- Increase number of drinking fountains
- Construct permanent restrooms

Based on research, it is also recommended for Hernando to address immediate needs identified in this plan in existing parks, but consider a future Sports Complex in a centralized location to meet the needs of Hernando residents better and to attract out-of-town visitors. Another suggestion is that baseball, softball, and soccer fields would be most beneficial to the city of Hernando. The following recommendations are for two-phase construction of the sports complex design.

Phase I should focus on the immediate needs of current outdoor sports' venues. This phase is needed to improve deteriorating baseball facilities, create softball-only facilities, and increase the size of current soccer facilities. Phase I is building a new facility that should first satisfy and meet the needs of Hernando residents'. Its secondary use should be to function as an attraction for out-of-town visitors to participate in weekend tournaments and events. The new facility would include a total of 12 baseball/softball fields and 5 soccer/multi-use fields. The Hernando sports complex administration should consist of a director, a grounds crew, and a marketing person. Additionally, the use of sponsorships should be considered to increase added financial profits while also promoting area businesses to both Hernando and out-of-town visitors.




Phase II would solely focus on enhancing the current equestrian setup of Hernando. This facility, which is already in operation, includes 53 acres with available land for expansion and provides a unique sporting opportunity for both local Hernando residents and attracting out-of-town visitors. However, the current facility needs upgrades including improved road access and additional parking for horse trailers and RV's. Also, it would be most beneficial to include a general manager who can coordinate all activities on the location and who has extensive knowledge of horses. The facility would need additional staff for horse boarding and administering camps, lessons, and activities.



4.2 IMPROVEMENTS TO EXISTING RECREATION FACILITIES TO MAXIMIZE MARKET SHARE

This section provides information regarding the existing sports/recreation facilities in the city of Hernando, MS. For an in-depth analysis, the main focus of the facilities is to include Milton Kuykendall Park, Civic Center, Conger Park, Hernando Soccer Park, and Renasant Dog/Skate Park. Each of these sports/recreation facilities offer unique infrastructure and characteristics. Due to the lack of efficient management caused by a variety of factors, the condition of the existing facilities needs attention.



1. RECOMMENDATION - PROPOSED IMPROVEMENT

This section aims to provide suggestions to improve the existing sports/recreation facilities and expectations for a potential new Hernando sports complex as future demand and funding are available to construct in the city of Hernando. Regarding existing facilities, improvements are needed to ensure ample space to grow and accommodate playing seasons with different time frames. A recommendation is that the sports complex administration cater first to Hernando residents to satisfy their needs with the primary focus on baseball, softball, and soccer events on weekdays, Monday through Thursday. The sports complex administration is encouraged to attract outside groups with partnerships to bring in tournaments and events for weekends, Friday through Sunday.

Potential targeted groups would be baseball, softball, soccer, and tennis organizations that offer regional travel opportunities for teams and participants. The Hernando sports complex administration should include a director, grounds crew, and marketing person.

1.1. SUGGESTION FOR A POTENTIAL NEW FACILITY IN HERNANDO

Based on research, it is recommended for Hernando to build a future sports complex in a centralized location to better meet the needs of Hernando residents and to attract out-of-town visitors. After on-site visit and evaluation, it is suggested a centralized location with baseball, softball, and soccer fields would be most beneficial to the city of Hernando. A centralized location with more space for all three sports would be optimal for catering to local Hernando residents and attracting out-of-town visitors for sports tournaments that would boost the Hernando economy. The following recommendations are for the sports complex design to be constructed in two total phases.

Phase I should focus on the immediate needs of current outdoor sports venues. This phase is needed to improve deteriorating baseball facilities, create softball-only facilities, develop additional tennis courts, and increase the size of current soccer facilities. Phase I is building a new facility that should first satisfy and meet the needs of Hernando residents. Its secondary use should be to function as an attraction for out-of-town visitors to participate in weekend tournaments and events. The new facility would include a total of 12 baseball/softball fields and 5 soccer/multi-use fields. The Hernando sports complex administration should consist of a director, a grounds crew, and a marketing person.

Additionally, the use of sponsorships should be considered to increases added financial profits while also promoting area businesses to both Hernando and out-of-town visitors.

Phase II would solely focus on enhancing the current equestrian facility. This facility, which is already in operation and has available land for expansion, includes 53 acres, provides a unique sporting opportunity for both local Hernando residents, and attracting out-of-town visitors to enhance the economic impact. However, the current facility needs upgrades, including improved road access and additional parking for horse trailers and RVs. In addition, it would be most beneficial to include a general manager that can coordinate all activities on the location and have extensive knowledge of horses. The facility would need additional staff for horse boarding and administering camps, lessons, and activities.



1.2. FUTURE SPORTS COMPLEX PHASE 1

1.2.1 Phase I Breakdown:

Baseball/Softball Fields:

- Four 225-feet softball fields
- Four 200-feet baseball fields
- Four 250- feet baseball fields
- One complex building
- Three quad concession buildings with restrooms
- Nine hundred and sixty (960) parking spaces with handicap parking; some select handicap spaces to be van accessible

Soccer Fields:

• Five (210 feet x 330 feet) fields which should also serve as a multi-use field for football and include a perimeter track around the confines for track and field access.

Tennis Courts:

• Six (78 feet x 36 feet with 2,106 square foot service area) courts available for both singles and doubles competition.

Characteristics essential to a successful sports complex include functional administration capabilities and family friendly attractions. The playing fields should be the core of the Hernando sports complex to provide a distinctive identity to the city and distinguish the sports complex from other existing sports complexes. First-class and professional playing fields with unique features and layouts will provide a renowned atmosphere to the city.

Baseball/Softball Fields:

The research team recommends three 4-plexes to provide quality fields for baseball and softball. This should include one 4-plex for softball to include 225 feet fields. There should be two 4-plexes for baseball with one quad hosting 200 feet baseball fields and the second quad hosting 250 feet baseball fields. These fields could also be used as multi-use fields for soccer when needed. With these accommodations, the new Hernando sports complex will adequately meet the needs of local Hernando teams and be an attraction point for regional baseball and softball tournaments. All fields should have lights, sub-surface drainage, and sprinkler systems for grass surfaces. Larger baseball fields should include batting cages and a bullpen area for pitchers to warm up. Additionally, the Hernando complex should include one complex building, three quad concession buildings with restrooms, and 960 parking spaces with handicap parking, including van-accessible spaces.

This new complex gives the city of Hernando a centralized location to operate current baseball and softball summer league programs for area youth. Due to the popularity of these sports and Mississippi's favorable climate, there is also potential to create spring and fall leagues for baseball and softball increasing playing opportunities for area youth. This field setup would make Hernando more competitive in host bids for both Dizzy Dean and USSSA Tournaments in baseball as well as



additional softball tournaments. With Hernando's location and access to major interstates of I-55, I-20, and I-40, the sports complex could become an optimal location to host regional tournaments for the Mississippi High School Activities Association, the Mississippi Association of Independent Schools, and other non-scholastic events. Hernando is between the major cities of Little Rock and Nashville. Because of this central location, the marketing director should recruit interscholastic teams and non-scholastic organizations. The complex would be an ideal host site to compete against regional teams. Currently, the summer is the busiest time frame for these sports, but we believe there are also great opportunities for both spring and fall leagues, which normally run from March to October.

Additionally, these facilities could be used as multi-purpose fields for additional outdoor sporting activities, including flag football, lacrosse, rugby, Frisbee, and other events. These additional activities could provide further recreational opportunities for local Hernando residents.

Soccer Fields:

The research team recommends five quality soccer fields with 210 feet by 330 feet dimensions. These fields could also be used as multi-use fields, for example, football. All fields should have lights, sub-surface drainage, and sprinkler systems for the grass surface. In addition, it should include one complex building, 2 concession buildings with restrooms, and 400 parking spaces with handicapped parking, including van-accessible spaces.

There is a great need for additional soccer field space not only to provide services for Hernando but also to attract local tournaments. Due to the location and mild weather, spring and fall leagues could be available with added tournaments and events that could be actively sought by Mississippi Soccer Association, MSA Soccer Tournaments, 3v3 Soccer Tournament, and Hispanic Soccer League. Due to Hernando's location and proximity to Memphis, the Hernando sports complex could become an ideal place to host regional and area tournaments and work with the Mississippi High School Activities Association, the Mississippi Association of Independent Schools, and other non-scholastic organization's events. Additionally with Hernando's middle distance from major cities of Little Rock and Nashville, we encourage the complex's marketing director to actively pursue both interscholastic teams and non-scholastic organizations as an ideal host site to compete against regional teams.

Additionally, these facilities could be used as multi-purpose fields for additional outdoor sporting activities, including flag football, lacrosse, rugby, Frisbee, and other events. These additional activities could provide further recreational opportunities for local Hernando residents.

Tennis Courts:

With the increased popularity of tennis and the ideal proximity to Memphis, researchers recommend additional tennis courts to allow for resident's play and to attract both adult and youth tennis tournaments. We recommend six (78 feet x 36 feet with 2,106 square foot service area) courts that would be available for singles and doubles competition play. Lighting to allow for night play and accompanying bleachers for participants' fans.



Additionally, these courts could also be used for pickleball that could provide additional recreational opportunities for local Hernando residents and potential tournaments.

Seating:

Permanent seating is recommended. With all fields in close proximity, they should be designed to feature natural berms for seating areas if possible. The research team also suggests bleacher seating with canopies if possible. All seating areas must be ADA compliant and meet local, state, and federal guidelines.

Scoreboards:

It is recommended that each field has an electronic scoreboard. Scoreboards should display the score, inning, balls and strikes for baseball and softball and the score, period, and time for soccer. Tennis scoreboards should be built at all court locations.

Scorer's Box/Press Box:

For each designated championship field for each sport, we recommend a small scorer or press area with room for a small staff of personnel to include an announcer, scorekeeper, and a scoreboard operation with public address system equipment. This setup is recommended for all fields due to the requirements of some regional and national tournaments.

Foul Poles, Goals, and Corner Flags:

All baseball and softball fields should include two (2) foul poles. All soccer fields should have two (2) goals and four (4) corner flags.

Warm-Up Area:

We recommend warm-up areas be included in the sports complex design to provide a space for teams to stretch, run, and stay active before, during, and in between games. This will help avoid crowded situations and distracting spectators if teams of upcoming games are too close to the game on the field. It also allows team participants ample needed space while ensuring fan safety.

Parking:

The sports complex location will need to provide the maximum parking capacity of the facility. The site should have approximately 72 to 90 parking spaces per field. Depending on the spot, the average roster per team will be approximately 12 to 15 players each. This will accommodate vehicles of the two teams playing, the two teams that played the previous game, and the two teams waiting to play the next game. The parking surface should meet local code, and handicap accessible parking must be available in the areas closest to the facility entrance, including van accessible vehicles. Of note, when we conducted site locations of Hernando sports facilities, there was a lack of ample ADA parking spots. To ensure proper ingress and egress of fans and especially tournament participants, it is imperative to have ample and quality parking. All parking areas should contain appropriate lighting for safety reasons.



1.3. PHASE II (EQUESTRIAN ACTIVITIES)

The planning team analyzed and studied additional recommendations for the full operation of a sustainable sports complex that could attract potential users from outside the primary regional market to increase revenues to the city of Hernando. Hernando currently has a unique setup with current equestrian facilities, with only Olive Branch having similar facilities. The planning team feel this specific type of sports facility could be a huge advantage to further attracting out-of-town visitors to Hernando and having a positive economic impact. Phase I will benefit a greater number of participants; therefore, Phase II should occur after Phase I is complete. However, due to its unique capacity, Phase II will also greatly affect the community. It should focus on improving current equestrian facilities, including structures, parking, and aesthetics, to allow attraction for equestrian events, rodeos, riding, barrel racing, show horses, and space for camper housing.

The current Civic Center location includes 53 areas and has adequate land space, including a lighted equestrian arena. However, the City needs to negotiate a land purchase or long-term lease along with an overall facility facelift to improve road access and additional parking for horse trailers and RVs. We encourage the Hernando sports complex administration to include a general manager that can coordinate all activities on the location and have extensive knowledge of horses. It will need additional staff for horse boarding and administering camps, lessons, and activities.

1.3.1 Phase II Breakdown:

- Outside grandstand area (covered if possible) with spectator seating
- 80 feet x 100 feet round pen
- Correct footing (and watering) for grandstand area and round pen
- 100 feet x 200 feet lighted riding arena
- Large area with a sizable jumping course
- Cattle shoot pens
- Stall barns
- Barn aisle
- 2 pastures for turnout
- 6 large tack rooms
- Fencing (no barbwire)
- Hot/cold wash rack
- Storage area for hay and feed
- Overnight boarding/horse motel
- Trailer hookups
- Staff lounge
- Lighting
- Restrooms



- Concessions
- Fans for circulation/ventilation
- Parking
- Security
- Maintenance equipment including tractor with front end loader, PTO, bush hog, arena drag, box blade

The equestrian center could be beneficial in serving Hernando residents while also attracting outof-town visitors. The targeted population should include adults and youth with riding experience. Other opportunities to attract resident and visitor participants include educational children's camps, horse camps, riding lessons, and birthday parties. Children's camps are a great opportunity to bring awareness to the facility while also introducing youth to equestrian activities. Horse camps for children would provide training conducted throughout the year. Targeted non-school sessions will provide opportunities for children while also bringing in revenue. Camps could be one-day camps at various time frames, and also offer multiple day camps for Mardi Gras, Easter, Thanksgiving, and Christmas time frames.

Riding lessons could provide for children and adults ranging through all levels of experience from beginners to intermediate and advanced riders. Rider package options could include group, semi-private, and private formats. Therapeutic riding is a non-traditional teaching approach for adults and youth with severe physical and cognitive disabilities, including autism. Grant monies are available for funding to assist promotions for attracting these additional customers.

This fun and friendly atmosphere would provide an enjoyable learning experience. At the same time, trainers conduct riding sessions to gauge the rider's experience level and then align them with an appropriate horse/pony. Riding lessons could be set up with various monthly, weekly, or pay per lesson schedules and would bring recurring revenue to the facility. Advertising through the local school district in Hernando and area communities in the Memphis area. The only competition is the Olive Branch Raintree Equestrian Center.

Birthday parties provide a unique opportunity for youth to have a party at the equestrian center and interact with horses. These types of activities bring further awareness to the facility and hopefully further supplement financial revenue in the future.





5.1 SUMMARY

Neel-Schaffer, Inc. requested assistance from the Department of Economic Development and Hospitality & Tourism at the University of Southern Mississippi to conduct an economic impact (EI) study of the city of Hernando. The research team has collected the primary data to determine the EI of the updated sports/recreation facilities in the city of Hernando.

ANALYTICAL FINDINGS:

- Depending on low, medium, or high demand, approximately \$1.6 million, \$5.6 million, or \$36.1 million in revenue will support 67, 288, or 656 direct jobs, with value-added \$3 million, \$7.4 million, or \$16.8 million, respectively.
- More specifically, depending on low, medium, or high demand, it is expected that an additional 7, 20, or 45 indirect jobs and 5, 21, or 47 induced jobs will be created with the impact of \$429K, \$1.4 million, or \$5.9 million, respectively.
- In total, the updated sports/recreation facilities can support substantial employment (80, 329, or 748 jobs) and economic impacts of \$2.0 million, \$7.0 million, or \$16.0 million annually for the region.
- Lastly, the updated sports/recreation facilities can generate \$49K, \$157K, or \$357K in fiscal impact or tax revenue for the city. A breakdown of the total tax revenue resulting from the updated facilities (low, medium, and high demand) is in Table 5-2.

5.2 INTRODUCTION & PURPOSE

INTRODUCTION

The city of Hernando is the county seat of DeSoto County, which is located on the northwest border of Mississippi, specifically 180 miles north of the state capitol. Hernando is the center of DeSoto County and has a total area of 25.8 square miles. According to the United States Census Bureau (USCB) (2020), the city's population was 16,811 in 2019, and the number of total housing units was 5,500, while its median household income was \$69,179 and the median housing value was \$81,100 (EMSI, 2020).

Hernando's local attractions range with a variety of options. Most of the attractions are outside-based with several parks and walking trails, including Conger Park, Bouchillon Park, Church Park, Renasant Park, Parkway Cove Park, and Ark Trail. Despite limitations in local traditional visitor amenities, visitors to the city still enjoy a full-service 18-hole golf course at Hernando Golf & Racquet Club, along with DeSoto County Museum, the Lewis Ranch, and more.

The city of Hernando plans to revamp the current sports/recreation facilities to improve residents' quality of life and attract out-of-town visitors to boost the local economy by creating new jobs and generating extra tax revenues. Overall, this project will contribute to the regional economy through direct, indirect, and induced effects. Direct effects occur when visitors go to restaurants, stay in a hotel, shop, and participate in other various activities. Indirect effects occur when businesses buy additional goods and services due to the spur in demand from visitors' actions. Subsequently, part of the money businesses earn by visitors' activities will be used to pay employees, owners, and suppliers. In turn, these people will spend their earnings locally, which will boost the local economy in an induced effect. Additional indirect and induced effects occur when supplier and service companies associated with hotels and restaurants purchase equipment, goods, and services for their firms. These purchases spur further activity, which causes additional economic impacts.

PURPOSE OF STUDY

The main purpose of this study is to examine the effects of out-of-town visitors (hereafter referred to as visitors) expenditures on the local economy, particularly local earnings. The economic activity of visitors generates added value to the general economy. Visitor spending figures represent only a portion of their actual value to relevant businesses and the regional economy.

The specific deliverables of the study include:

- Determine the anticipated economic impact of an updated sports/recreation facilities on local communities by collecting the data via online surveys and further analyzing existing data provided by Neel-Schaffer.
 - Compile data collected and run IMPLAN Input-Output model
 - Prepare a final written report that will be inclusive of the economic impact measured by:
 - 1. Jobs Supported
 - 2. Per Capita Income



- 3. Multiplier Effect (e.g., Direct, Indirect, and Induced Effect)
- 4. Estimated Fiscal Impact
- The final deliverable will also be inclusive of per visitor spending on
 - 1. Accommodation
 - 2. Dining
 - 3. Shopping
 - 4. Local transportation, including gas or fuel



5.3 ECONOMIC IMPACT OF PROPOSED IMPROVEMENTS

1. BRIEF GUIDE TO IMPLAN

How IMPLAN works

- Social Accounting: IMPLAN's <u>Social Accounting Matrices</u> (SAMs) capture the actual dollar amounts of all business transactions taking place in a regional economy as reported each year by businesses and governmental agencies. SAM accounts are a better measure of economic flow than traditional input/output accounts because they include "non-market" transactions. Examples of these transactions would be taxes and unemployment benefits.
- Multipliers: Social Accounting Matrices constructed to show the effects of a given change on the economy of interest. These are called <u>Multiplier Models</u>. Multiplier Models study the impacts of a user specified change in the chosen economy for 440 different industries. Because the Multiplier Models are built directly from the region-specific Social Accounting Matrices, they will reflect the region's unique structure and trade situation.
 - Multiplier Models are the frameworks for building impact analysis questions. Derived mathematically, these models estimate the magnitude and distribution of economic impacts and measure three types of effects, which are in the final report. These are the direct, indirect, and induced changes within the economy.
- Trade Flows Method: Unique to IMPLAN data, 2008 and forward, is a method of tracking regional purchases by <u>estimating trade flows</u>. An updated and improved method for calculating and tracking the movement of commodities between industries within a region, this method tracks over 500 commodities in each study area and allows more accurate capturing of indirect and induced effects. This method of capturing regional purchase coefficients also makes it possible for the Version 3 software to perform <u>Multi-Regional Analysis</u>, which shows a change in local regions and causes additional effects on surrounding areas.

2. IMPLAN DEFINITIONS

- Total Local Impact A cumulative statement of net job growth. The statement tallies the direct local operations, the single year of direct local renovation, and the indirect and local impact.
- Direct Local Impact Taken from the datasets provided by IMPLAN Pro v.3.0. The IMPLAN model translates sales into the number of employees through a labor productivity rate (equates to output per employee). The result provides the direct number of employees for the renovation phase and operations as well as the indirect effects of such stimulus.
- Indirect Local Impact The IMPLAN model quantifies the indirect economic and employment effects. This number represents the impacts (change in employment, output, labor income, and taxation) on all local industries caused by the expenditures in the supply chain generated by the direct effects of final demand changes. Induced effects may also reflect government and investment spending.



- Induced Local Impact The IMPLAN model quantifies the induced economic and employment effects. This number represents the impacts (changes in employment) on all local industries caused by the expenditures of new household income generated by the direct and indirect effects of final demand changes. Induced effects may also reflect government and investment spending.
- Output The output of an economy is the amount of production in dollars, including all intermediate goods purchased as well as value-added (labor, capital, and profit). It can also be thought of as sales for both final goods and services and intermediate goods and services. The output is dependent upon consumption in the area, state government spending, investment, and exports of the industries in the region.
- Employment The Employment in the IMPLAN model contains historical data from the Bureau of Economic Analysis (BEA).
- Labor Income Key variable in the IMPLAN regional analysis that affects the potential labor force spending and consumption.

3. DATA ANALYSIS

IMPLAN Input/Output model is used to estimate the economic impact of the updated sports/recreation facilities in the city of Hernando. In this study, out-of-town visitors (i.e., visitors) are defined as those who reside outside of the city, which may include day-trip attendees, visit friends and relatives (VFR) market, casuals, and time-switchers. More importantly, multipliers estimate the amount of direct, indirect, and induced effects; for example, in this study, the direct economic impact is created by various attendees, whereas indirect economic impact is considered additional jobs and payroll created or supported in the surrounding economy as a result of purchases by shops, hotels, and restaurants where out-of-town visitors stay and shop, possibly, including residents' extra spending at shops, restaurants, and so on. Also, the induced economic effect consists of changes in economic activity resulting from household spending of income earned directly or indirectly from attendees' spending.

Through an online survey, visitors estimated their spending in the eight categories: lodging, food and beverage, carry-out food, tour and transportation, parking, retail shopping, other recreation (entertainment), and all other spending (see Appendix A). Based on the surveys collected, the average spending per person figures was calculated. As shown in Table 5-3, visitors were estimated to spend approximately \$161.42 per person on updated sports/recreation facilities in Hernando during their trip. The majority of this spending would be directly related to the facility visit, including retail shopping (\$18.45), food and beverage (\$28.58), all other spending (\$56.71), and lodging (\$17.81).

For this study, carry-out food is combined with food and beverage, while parking fees with tour and transportation to run the IMPLAN Input-Output model. Based on the surveys collected, average spending per person figures was calculated. Multiplying the average spending per person by the estimated number of attendees yields an overall estimate of visitor spending. More importantly, the estimated number of attendees to the updated sports/recreation facilities with the three different scenarios includes a low (38,380 visitors), medium (76,416 visitors), and high demand scenarios (173,860 visitors) (see Appendix B).

4.1 LOW DEMAND SCENARIO

Total

In the low impact scenario, the total spending for each category is calculated by multiplying the average per-person spending by the total number of annual visitors (i.e., 38,380 visitors per year). Due to leakage that occurs while new money circulates through the economy, only 65% of total spending will remain as final demand in the local economy. As shown in Table 5-4, the lodging sector (NAICS 721110) will experience \$683,419 in economic activity generated directly by visitor activity. Visitors will generate additional economic activity through dining and leisure shopping during their stay. The food and beverage (NAICS 722310) sector will generate \$1,607,610 in revenue. These figures include money spent at supermarkets to prepare meals instead of dining out. Also, the shopping sector (NAICS 453220) will experience \$707,983 in sales generated by visitors' activities. Leakages occur when dollars seep out of the local economy as local businesses purchase goods and services from suppliers. For instance, only \$444,222 will show as final demand generated for lodging after leakage occurs.







Figure 5-1 Overall Economic Impact by Low Demand Scenarios





Figure 1-B shows the estimated amount of earnings and consumption the local labor force may generate due to the updated sports/recreation facilities in Hernando. In the low impact scenario, the updated facility will generate \$1,598,820 in direct effects, \$238,312 in indirect effects, and \$190,693 in induced effects. Overall, the estimated total effect of labor income is \$2,027,825.

Figure 1-C shows the value-added breakdown, which will provide for the city's economy. The updated sports/recreation facilities are estimated to generate \$2,254,403 in direct effects, \$389,166 in indirect effects, and \$394,064 in induced effects. Overall, the estimated total effect of value added is \$3,037,633.

Output is driven by factors that include state government spending, investment, consumption in the local economy, and exports of the industries in the region. Figure 1-D shows that the updated sports/recreation facilities are estimated to generate \$3,763,054 in direct effects, \$867,894 in indirect effects, and \$707,368 in induced effects. Overall, the estimated total effect of output is \$5,338,316.

Table 5-6 shows the breakdown of which industries will be affected most by the completion of the updated sports/recreation facilities in Hernando. The top industries affected by the updated facilities are all other food and drinking places (26 jobs), transit and ground passenger transit (17 jobs), retail (10 jobs), hotels and motels (9 jobs), and other amusement and recreation (7 jobs). On the other hand, the following industries will be affected by the updated facilities in a smaller manner: other real estates (1 job), employment services (1 job), owner-occupied dwellings (0 job), monetary authorities and depository credit intermediation (0 job), and hospitals (0 job). The overall county, state, and federal impacts resulting from the updated sports/recreation facilities are presented in Table 5-7, Table 5-8, and Table 5-9, respectively.

4.2 MEDIUM DEMAND SCENARIO

In this scenario, the research team computed the IMPLAN Input-Output model for the Hernando project based on the estimation of the updated sports/recreation facilities attracting 76,416 visitors per year.


As seen in Table 5-10, the lodging sector (NAICS 721110) will experience \$1,360,714.24 in economic activity generated directly by visitor activity. Similarly, the Food and Beverage (NAICS 722310) sector will generate \$3,200,811.52 in revenue, including money spent at supermarkets to prepare meals. The shopping sector (NAICS 453220) will experience \$1,409,620.48 in sales generated by visitor activities.

As shown in Table 5-11, the updated sports/recreation facilities are estimated to generate over \$5.6 million in revenue, which will support 288 direct jobs. Additionally, Figure 2.A shows the updated facilities are estimated to create 20 indirect jobs with 21 induced jobs. Overall, the total employment impact, including direct, indirect, and induced job growth, is estimated at 329 total jobs.

Figure 2.B shows the estimated amount of earnings and consumption the local labor force may generate because of the updated sports/recreation facilities. In the medium impact scenario, the updated facilities will generate \$5,640,097 (direct effects), \$670,836 (indirect effects), and \$723,518 (induced effects). Overall, the estimated total effect of labor income is \$7,034,451.






Figure 2.C shows the value-added breakdown, which will provide for the city's economy. The updated sports/recreation facilities are estimated to generate \$7,400,990 (direct effects), \$1,089,756 (indirect effects), and \$1,495,255 (induced effects). Overall, the estimated total effect of value added is \$9,986,001.

Figure 2.D also shows the updated sports/recreation facilities are estimated to generate \$11,825,876 (direct effects), \$2,464,817 (indirect effects), and \$2,684,861 (induced effects). Overall, the estimated total effect of output is \$16,975,554.

4.3 HIGH DEMAND SCENARIO

In the high demand impact scenario, the total spending for each category is calculated by multiplying the average per-person spending by 173,860 visitors per year. As seen in Table 5-16, the lodging sector (721110) will experience \$3,095,867 in economic activity generated directly by visitor activity, while the Food and Beverage (NAICS 722310) sector will generate \$7,282,415 in revenue. Also, the shopping sector (NAICS 453220) will experience \$3,207,137 in sales generated by visitors' activities. However, only \$2,012,313 will show as final demand generated for lodging after leakage occurs.





As shown in Table 5-17, the updated sports/recreation facilities expect to generate over \$12.8 million in revenue, which further supports 656 direct jobs. Additionally, Figure 3.A shows the updated facilities are estimated to create 45 indirect jobs with 47 induced jobs. Overall, the total employment impact, including direct, indirect, and induced job growth, is estimated at 748 total jobs.



Figure 3.B shows the estimated amount of earnings and consumption the local labor force may generate due to the updated sports/recreation facilities. In the high impact scenario, the updated facilities will generate \$12,832,224 in direct effects, \$1,526,272 in indirect effects, and \$1,646,131 in induced effects. Overall, the estimated total effect of labor income is \$16,004,627.

Figure 3.C shows the value-added breakdown, which will provide for the city's economy. The updated sports/recreation facilities are estimated to generate \$16,838,568 in direct effects, \$2,479,389 in indirect effects, and \$3,401,971 in induced effects. Overall, the estimated total effect of value added is \$22,719,928.

Output is driven by factors that include state government spending, investment, consumption in the local economy, and exports of the industries in the region. Figure 3.D shows the updated sports/recreation facilities are estimated to generate \$26,905,972 in direct effects, \$5,607,897 in indirect effects, and \$6,108,538 in induced effects. Overall, the estimated total effect of output is \$38,622,407.

As shown in Table 5-18, the top industries affected by the updated sports/recreation facilities are the other personal services (351 jobs), all other food and drinking places (119 jobs), transit and ground passenger transport (75 jobs), retail (44 jobs), and hotels and motels (39 jobs). However, the following sectors will see a smaller impact generated by the updated sports/recreation facilities: other amusement and recreation (34 jobs), other real estate (7 jobs), employment services (6 jobs), hospitals (3 jobs), and owner-occupied dwellings (0 jobs). Additionally, the overall city, state, and federal impacts resulting from the Hernando project are in Table 5-19, Table 5-20, and Table 5-21, respectively.

5.4 LIMITATIONS & CONCLUSIONS

Despite adherence to the basic principles of economic impact analysis and cautious efforts to accurately sample visitors and, thus, estimate the total attendance, the resulting impacts might still remain "best estimates." There are likely to be some measurement errors in the total attendance count. In this regard, visitors' spending pattern is examined and further compared along with previous research (Croft, Allen, and Kim, 2018; Kim, 2019; Stoner, Kim, and Miller, 2016), ensuring that visitors' spending data (or spending pattern) seems to be comparable to previous research, except food and beverage (722310) and shopping (453220). In this study, for example, average spending per person figure was \$41.9 for food and beverage, which is significantly less than other economic impact studies (about \$94), whereby shopping (18.45) is about \$40 less in comparison to other studies.

Notwithstanding the assumption of good faith efforts by respondents to provide accurate data, survey errors are inevitable and their marginal errors might not be measurable. As Crompton (2001) indicated, "the questionable assumption has to be made that the error is random and thus self-canceling" (p. 87). Despite its weaknesses and limitations, therefore, we believe that this economic impact analysis of the updated sports/recreation facilities is valuable in understanding its importance to the regional economy, as well as the community.

1.0 CONCLUSIONS

The updated sports/recreation facilities will contribute to the regional economy through direct, indirect, and induced effects. Depending on low (38,380 visitors), medium (76,416 visitors), or high demand (173,860 visitors) scenarios, it is estimated that approximately \$1.6 million, \$5.6 million, or \$36.1 million in revenue will support 67, 288, or 656 direct jobs, with value-added \$3.0 million, \$7.4 million, or \$16.8 million, respectively. Additionally, it is expected that an additional 7, 20, or 45 indirect jobs and 5, 21, or 47 induced jobs will be created with the impact of \$429K, \$1.4 million, or \$5.9 million, respectively.

Overall, the updated sports/recreation facilities will support substantial employment (80, 329, or 748 jobs) and economic impacts of \$2.0 million, \$7.0 million, or \$16.0 million annually for the region. Also, the updated sports/recreation facilities will generate \$49K, \$272K, or \$513K in fiscal impact or tax revenue for the city depending on low, medium, or high demand scenario of out-of-town visitors. Table 5-22 shows a breakdown of the total tax revenue resulting from the updated sports/recreation facilities depending on the low, medium, and high demand scenarios.






